1.If anything was possible, what would your dream job be, and why?

My dream job would be a published author.

For as long as I can remember, I have been writing. Anyone who knows me knows that, given all the time in the world, I would simply choose to just write and write... and write. I can spend hours and days simply making up different kinds of plots for different kinds of genres. I can build worlds and characters then give them all individual identities, each a unique one of their own. I like to think that I am great at creative writing. It is a skill that I am very much confident in and very comfortable with doing. Given the chance, I want to show my works to the world. I want to do it full-time and get paid for it. If only it were possible, I would want this passion of mine to be something that could bring me a financially stable life.

2. Have you ever experienced a stressful situation in your past workplace (college if fresh graduate), what was it and how did you overcome it?

Yes, I have.

There was a time in the University when our professor tasked us to create a reflection paper for each chapter in our book, as well as a political analysis paper about any international political issue of our choosing. The book alone consists of over 30 chapters. We were given a month to finish them all. In short, we only had thirty days to read, review, and write everything. These tasks would determine our final grade for our major subject.

I remember spending nights bawling my eyes out in our dormitory, feeling completely overwhelmed and exhausted. But I did what I believe I do best, and that was to continue moving forward. This was how I handled the situation. One hand would be wiping away the tears on my cheeks, while the other continued to write down notes.

3. In your previous position, what task did you find most challenging and why? What task did you enjoy most and why?

In my previously employment, the task that I found most challenging was when I had to interact with other people working on the same loan but on a different assignment.

I didn't talk much in my previous work. But it was more of a choice since I had to conserve my energy as it was a night shift.

5. What personal or professional accomplishments are you most proud of?
