

1.If anything was possible, what would your dream job be, and why?

On average, I check around 10-15 contributors on a daily basis. It was a hectic and challenging task, but I managed to pull through.

During my internship program, my supervisors and coworkers would describe me as an efficient worker. I finished all my assigned tasks way ahead of schedule. Overall, I learned a lot during those 4 months, not just in the field of work but also outside of work as well.
