

1. If anything was possible, what would your dream job be, and why?

By the time I finally finished the edited manuscript, it was nearing midnight, and around 12:30 AM my teacher finally gave me the okay to print the paper.



3. In your previous position, what task did you find most challenging and why? What task did you enjoy most and why?

I was a teaching intern at Negros Occidental High School. One of the most challenging tasks I have done was presenting my teaching demonstration. I never liked talking in front of a lot of people. Not only that, the students in the class I was going to teach were very rowdy and barely paid attention whenever their teacher was delivering her lesson.
