



1. If anything was possible, what would your dream job be, and why?

3. In your previous position, what task did you find most challenging and why? What task did you enjoy most and why?

I was an IT Support Intern in Ubiquity Global Services for three months. We needed to render 500 hours of internship for school credit. And it's interesting because it was a new experience for me. The tasks were challenging at first, but after we were taught by our seniors how to handle them, they became easy. We did a lot of troubleshooting and resolving the PC issues that the employees encountered, whether it be hardware, software, or network-related issues. We also did some auditing in the stock room, and also fixed broken peripherals, but if the peripherals were no longer fixable, we just replaced them. I would say that our job description had a very wide scope.

If I could think about the most challenging part, it was the time when we had to manually update the software that the employees were using. The tasks themselves were easy, but the number of repetitions that we needed to do them were exhausting. I had to update around 300 PCs, and that is the quantity after we already divided the work for us five interns. I also had to respond to tickets from different floors and I had to walk back and forth from those different floors multiple times just to fix an issue. I think the worst part was we were not being paid at all. Not even allowances.

4. How would your previous managers/coworkers describe you?

By the time we all became close with the seniors and other interns, they opened up and said that at first, they thought I was unfriendly or a snob because according to them I have a resting mean face, so they were all so surprised that out of all the interns, I was the first one who got along very well with them. It's probably because I respected all the differences that we had, and I always kept an open mind. Also, I'm very loud and joke around a lot once I get comfortable around people. In the first few days, however, I was the most silent and shy person in the room. When my internship was about to come to an end, and my seniors needed to give me an evaluation, some of their feedback was I had a really good work ethic, and I was always on time even when there were days when there were not many tasks. They also said that I learned faster compared to the other interns, I was able to work independently under minimal supervision.
