

1. If anything was possible, what would your dream job be, and why?

2. Have you ever experienced a stressful situation in your past workplace (college if fresh graduate), what was it and how did you overcome it?

3. In your previous position, what task did you find most challenging and why? What task did you enjoy most and why?

During my internship, I found checking control numbers on the requisition and issue slips documents of each client for the year 2023-2024 the most challenging. The office that I interned in has no application or system for checking the control numbers. They rely on the traditional way, which is logging in the entries in the logbook; however, the one who is in charge of it is not accurately logging it to the logbook. Approximately 500 to 1,000 skips of entries are detectable in the documents each year. There were a lot of missing and faulty entries of control numbers, so we had to re-check and sign it initially to our supervisor and also redo it on the client's original folder. My fellow intern made a spreadsheet, and we encoded all available, missing, and duplicate control numbers and shared it with our supervisor. With the guidance of our supervisor and help from my fellow intern, we successfully finished 2025 down to 2023.

Nevertheless, I enjoyed the task my supervisor entrusted us with. We were able to correct the information on the client's folder, which is essential in the credibility of the client's process. I also enjoyed verifying contents in cases (this was during my legal internship) in the legal office. These experiences provided me with the opportunity to improve my data entry, accuracy, and communication skills; explore our system; and develop my workplace etiquette, such as integrity and confidentiality skills.

4. How would your past colleagues or managers describe your work ethic?

Before entering our internship period, we were equipped with knowledge and skills to be able to perform well in our workplace. My co-interns would describe me as having a good work ethic. Based on our supervisor's evaluation, I am dedicated to finishing my tasks with minimal to zero errors. I always make sure to show up on time in the office, be productive, and make the most of my tasks at work. I also have a positive vibe in the office. While my co-interns are comfortable working with me, we also had great chemistry working side-by-side. Also, our supervisor has described us, the interns, as reliable and commendable.

Our dedication and performance in the general office internship were acknowledged by our supervisor. The general office internship concluded with our supervisor writing a letter addressed to our internship coordinator, stating how commendable our performance was.
